Bars & Clubs

Most of Barcelona's gay bars and clubs are located in the **Gaixample** (Eixample district), a three-block area north of Gran Via de les Corts Catalanes, between Urgell and Universitat metro stations. This is Barcelona's official gayborhood—think rainbow crosswalks, Pride flags, and LGBTQ+-owned businesses on every corner.

■ STUDENT BUDGET TIP: Many bars have happy hours from 6-9pm with 2-for-1 drinks. Pre-drinking (botellón) in parks or plazas before going out is common and saves money!

Gran Via • Mixed queer crowd; drag/burlesque nights, expertly crafted cocktails, lounge + dance

La Casa de la Pradera

Raval • Chill, neighborhood feel; FREE tapa with drink; terrace; very mixed ages

Madame Jasmine

"Gender-fuck" house party energy; maximalist decor; wild nights

El Cangrejo

Raval • Legendary drag bar; 80s pop; campy shows since the 1970s; local + tourist mix

Priscilla Café

Laid-back café-bar homage to the film; daytime friendly; queer mixed

Punto BCN

Gaixample staple; gets busy early (popular pre-club spot); CHEAP DRINKS; mixed locals/visitors

La Carrà

Raffaella Carrà-themed; 70s memorabilia; daily boogie 17:00-late; pop classics

Strass

Nightly drag shows at 23:30; bingo Sundays; high-camp fun

La Federica

Poble-sec • Cozy queer cocktail bar; pastel 70s vintage decor; excellent gin & tonics; themed parties

Moeem

Busy social bar; themes, bingo nights; 20s-40s mix; late-night buzz

Mykonos

40+ pop/80s crowd; chill, roomy, nostalgic vibes

La Chapelle

Small, artsy, strong mojitos; mixed ages; intimate atmosphere

Museum

Pop-camp museum decor; CHEAP DRINKS; weekend late start; young/trendy after 11pm

Versailles

Glam chandeliers; dance-leaning; confident, dress-up crowd

Bianco & Nero

Gaixample bar; classic pop/social vibe

Pink Corner

Believe Group • Gay bar & terrace; colorful cocktails; drag queens; welcoming to all LGBTQ+ spectrum

Blond Ambition

Madonna-themed space with paraphernalia; also features Britney, Gaga, and pop icons

Boys Bar BCN

Gaixample • Vibrant bar with go-go dancers, dance floor, themed parties; modern design

The Moon

Caribbean-inspired decor; young crowd in 20s-30s; gogo boys; regular 2-FOR-1 DRINK OFFERS

Bardaixa

New LGBTQ-owned tapas bar & winery; excellent wine, tapas, tostadas; terrace seating; closed Tuesdays

Bear & Masculine-Leaning Venues

Honey Furry Bar

Bear-friendly; convivial atmosphere; Thursday happy hour very popular

Bacon Bear Bar

Bear central; 40+ skew; no-attitude atmosphere; friendly; busy especially Thursday nights; HAPPY HOUR from 7pm

Night Barcelona

Cruisy bar with darkroom & cabins; diverse, flirty crowd; opens 18:00 daily

Teddy Bar

Cozy spot for bears and chasers; 2-FOR-1 DRINKS Sunday nights; closed Mondays

Upscale & Stylish Cocktail Bars

Sky Bar by Axel

Axel Hotel rooftop • Stylish rooftop cocktails; mixed LGBTQ+ & allies; city views

Plata Cocktail Bar

Neon pop-art cocktails; gay-friendly mixed crowd; sun terrace for people-watching; visually stunning drinks

STUDENT TIP: Save the upscale bars for special occasions. For daily socializing, stick to Punto BCN, Museum, or La Casa de la Pradera (free tapas!).

Clubs & Late Night Dancing

Arena Experience

Grupo Arena • Barcelona's premier gay club with 2 dance floors (pop/charts, house); opens nightly; late-night energy after 1am

Believe Club

Believe Group • Drag shows nightly; queer club energy; cabaret performances; opens very late

Metro Disco

Popular LGBTQ+ club; drag shows; late-night dancing; Pride weekend hot spot

Safari Disco Club

Hosts Bananas Party (Fridays) and Yass! Party (Saturdays); Sundays feature darkroom; diverse crowd

Black Box Disco

Arena Group • House, Nu Disco, Techno; dance club for bears and leather lovers; hosts CRU Fetish Disco

■ STUDENT BUDGET TIP: Club entry is often €10-15 with a drink included. Check for student discounts or arrive before 1am for reduced entry at some venues.

Major Festivals & Events

Barcelona Pride (Late June - Mid July)

Dates: June 28 - July 19, 2025 (Agenda Social: June 28-July 12; Pride Weekend: July 17-19)

Parade: Saturday, July 19 along Avinguda del Paral·lel ending at Plaça d'Espanya

Barcelona Pride combines activism and Mediterranean celebration. The parade features around 30 floats, thousands of marchers, and culminates in Pride Village at Plaça d'Espanya with FREE concerts, drag performances, food trucks, and art exhibitions. Official afterparties happen at Arena, Metro Disco, Believe Club, and Safari (Bananas & Yass! parties). The 2025 theme is "LGBTQIA+ Culture: Universal Culture."

History: The first Spanish Pride took place in Barcelona on June 26, 1977, making this the birthplace of Spain's LGBTQ+ liberation movement.

■ STUDENT TIP: Pride Village events are mostly FREE! Perfect for students. Just budget for drinks and food.

Circuit Festival (August)

Dates: August 9-17, 2025

Europe's largest gay circuit party festival, attracting 70,000+ attendees from around the world. Circuit features 10 days of massive parties including the iconic Aqua Park Day (Tuesday, Aug 12), the closing Saturday main party, and numerous themed events. Expect world-class DJs, shirtless crowds, and nonstop celebration. Many attendees stay in nearby Sitges (40 min by train) and commute to Barcelona for the parties. Book tickets and accommodations months in advance.

STUDENT WARNING: Circuit Festival is EXPENSIVE (party tickets €50-150+, accommodation prices triple). Consider volunteering for free entry or enjoying the free beach/street energy instead.

Other Major Events

- Matinée Easter Weekend April 18-20, 2025. Spring circuit party with pool parties and Water Park party.
- Girlie Circuit Female version of Circuit Festival, celebrating queer women with fabulous parties.
- Barcelona Queer Film Festival November 2025 (full format), with smaller screenings year-round.
- Carnestoltes LGBTIQ+ February. Barcelona's gay Carnival celebration in Eixample.
- PopAir Barcelona Monthly party open to everyone; relaxed attitude; cute scruffy guys.
- Tanga Party Over-the-top fun gay party during special weekends and festivals.

Gay Beaches & Outdoor Spaces

■ BEACHES ARE FREE! This is one of the best budget-friendly activities in Barcelona.

Mar Bella Beach — The Main Gay Beach

Location: Poble Nou district (Metro: L4 Poblenou, 10-min walk; or Bus 41)

Vibe: Barcelona's official gay nude beach; clothing optional; body positive; very busy in summer

Mar Bella is THE spot for Barcelona's gay beach scene. Expect a lively, international crowd of mostly gay men (with some queer women and allies). The beach gets especially packed during Circuit Festival in August—arrive early to secure a spot! The beach has a designated nudist section, though not everyone goes nude. Relax, sunbathe, swim, and socialize in this welcoming Mediterranean paradise.

Chiringuito BeGay: The iconic beach bar/restaurant right on Mar Bella is the social hub. Serves cold drinks, snacks, cocktails, and full meals (Mediterranean & international cuisine, €5-32). Great for meeting people and recovering from late nights. Open during beach season (roughly May-September).

■ STUDENT TIP: Bring your own snacks and water from a supermarket (Mercadona, Lidl) to save €€€. Beach bar prices are tourist-level.

Other Gay-Friendly Beaches

- Playa de Sant Sebastià Older, more mature gay crowd; accessible (amphibious chairs available); close to city center near W Hotel; relaxed vibe for gay couples.
- Nova Icària Beach Between Mar Bella and Sant Sebastià; more laid-back; less crowded; gay-friendly but mixed.
- Barceloneta Beach Central, famous, lively; mixed crowd including LGBTQ+ people; many beach bars and restaurants nearby.

Gay Saunas

Barcelona has four excellent gay saunas, three operated by Grupo Pases and open 24/7. All are clean, modern, and well-maintained with jacuzzis, steam rooms, dry saunas, dark rooms, mazes, and cruising areas. Saunas get busiest after the clubs close (2-6am), essentially serving as unofficial afterparties. During big events like Circuit or Pride, expect lines to enter. Average entry: €18-23.

■■ STUDENT NOTE: Saunas require you to be 18+. Bring photo ID.

Sauna Casanova (Carrer de Casanova 57, Gaixample)

The busiest and most popular sauna, known as the 'party sauna.' Open 24/7. Largest in Spain at 1400m² across 3 floors. Features: huge jacuzzi (20+ people), swimming pool, dry & wet saunas, extensive dark rooms, maze with private cubicles, fetish area with swing, stylish bar. Young, muscled, international crowd. Gets packed 2-6am on weekends. Entry: €22 (higher during Circuit/Pride). FREE entry Wednesdays if 22cm+!

Sauna Thermas (Carrer de la Diputació 46)

Second largest at 900m², also by Grupo Pases. Open 24/7. Features: two pools, 12-person jacuzzi, dark rooms, cruising area, bar & buffet. Slightly less busy than Casanova but still very popular. Entry: €23.

Sauna Condal (Carrer d'Espolsa-sacs 1)

Open 24/7. Popular for themed parties: bears, leather, naked nights. Features: massive 12-person jacuzzi, steam room, dry sauna, dark room, maze, cabins. Welcomes all body types—favorite of bears, chubs, older guys, and kinky crowd. Entry: €22.

Sauna Bruc (Pau Claris 87)

Independent sauna for mature men (40+) and admirers. Smaller, more relaxed vibe. Open daily 10am-10pm (not 24/7). Features: Finnish sauna, Turkish bath, jacuzzi, small pool, bar, dining area. Naked pool party 1st & 3rd Saturdays. Entry: €16.80.

■ Pro Tip: All saunas provide towels, flip-flops, and free condoms/lube. Bring photo ID (18+ required). Safe sex is emphasized. BCN Checkpoint in Gaixample offers FREE STI testing.

LGBTQ+ Groups & Activities

■ MOST OF THESE ACTIVITIES ARE FREE OR LOW-COST! Perfect for students wanting to meet people.

Sports & Culture

- Panteres Grogues LGBTQ+ sports & culture club Huge menu: volleyball, swimming, tennis, rowing, hiking, yoga, etc.; very welcoming community; HQ on Carrer Floridablanca
- Barcelona Gay Men's Chorus (BGMC) Auditioned community chorus; year-round performances celebrating LGBTQ+ culture through music
- Barcelona Rainbow Singers Inclusive mixed LGBTQ+ choir; welcoming to all voices and identities

Social & Outdoor Activities

- **BCN Queer Squad** Diverse social activities: board games + karaoke nights, language exchange meetups, volleyball, water sports, organized day trips
- Dykes that Hike / Queers que Caminan Hiking and outdoor adventures for queer women & non-binary folks; exploring Catalonia's nature
- Queer Hike | BCN (We Create Space) Seasonal queer hikes & outdoor meetups; building community through nature
- Queer Pong Club Lesbian-leaning ping-pong meetup in Poble-sec; first Monday of most months; active and fun way to meet people
- Board game nights Multiple recurring Meetup groups welcome LGBTQ+ community; multilingual; various locations
- Queer Surf Club Global organization with BCN chapter; surfing days and trips pop up seasonally; inclusive to all skill levels

STUDENT TIP: Check Meetup.com for current events. These groups are great for making friends and practicing Spanish/Catalan!

Day Trip: Sitges

Distance: 40 minutes by train (R2S line from Barcelona)

Cost: ~€4-5 each way

Vibe: Europe's "gayest town" — small seaside paradise with 26 beaches and huge LGBTQ+ scene

■ STUDENT BUDGET WIN: At under € 10 round-trip, Sitges is one of the most affordable day trips from Barcelona!

Sitges (pop. 30,000) is THE queer beach destination near Barcelona. This charming coastal town is packed with gay bars, clubs, beaches, and has an openly LGBTQ+ population and culture. Perfect for a day trip or overnight stay. Many Circuit Festival attendees stay in Sitges and commute to Barcelona for parties.

Gay Beaches in Sitges

- Bassa Rodona Main gay beach; centrally located; 10 min walk from train station
- Balmins Beach Clothing-optional; packed with suntanned bodies; between old town and marina
- Playa del Muerto Secluded nude beach; 1-hour walk from station; peaceful, carefree vibe

Events in Sitges

- Sitges Pride June annually; fabulous celebration
- Bear Week September; international bear gathering
- Sitges Carnival February/March; one of Spain's most flamboyant

TRANSPORTATION TIP: Last trains from Sitges to Barcelona leave around 11pm. For late-night Circuit parties, take MonBus night buses (N30 line) from Plaça Catalunya to Sitges (35-45 min, cheaper than taxis which cost ∼€70).

Neighborhoods & Getting Around

Gaixample (Eixample)

The heart of gay Barcelona. Centered around Carrer de Casanova, Carrer Diputació, and Gran Via. Rainbow crosswalks, most gay bars/clubs/saunas, LGBTQ+-owned businesses. Grid layout makes navigation easy. Stay here to be in the center of the action. Metro: Urgell or Universitat stations.

Raval

Alternative, artsy queer scene. Raw, authentic, creative energy. Home to drag bars like El Cangrejo and La Casa de la Pradera. Feminist bookstores, gender-nonconforming spaces, queer-owned cafés like La Raposa. Less polished than Gaixample but deeply authentic.

Poble-sec

Emerging queer neighborhood with cozy cocktail bars (La Federica) and alternative venues. More local, less touristy. Great for a change of pace from Gaixample.

Poblenou

Beach neighborhood where Mar Bella is located. Charming walking street (Rambla del Poblenou) with excellent cafés and restaurants. More residential but worth exploring.

Transportation

Metro (TMB): Efficient, affordable, extensive. Key stations: Universitat (L1/L2), Urgell (L1), Poblenou (L4). Single ticket ~€2.55; **T-Casual 10-ride card** ~**€12.15** (BEST VALUE!).

Bus: Extensive network including night buses. Useful routes to beaches: 26, H16, V27, 41.

Taxi/Uber: Taxis readily available. From Gaixample to Mar Bella ~€10-15. Airport to city ~€35-40 by taxi; **Aerobus** ~€7.75 (much cheaper!).

Walking: Barcelona is very walkable! Gaixample to Raval is 15-20 min walk. Gothic Quarter and Las Ramblas are nearby.

■ STUDENT TIP: Get the T-Casual card immediately! It saves about 50% vs single tickets. Valid on metro, bus, and tram.

Safety & Practical Tips

Safety for LGBTQ+ Travelers

Barcelona is one of the safest and most LGBTQ+-friendly cities in Europe. Same-sex couples openly hold hands, kiss, and show affection throughout the city without issue. Spain legalized same-sex marriage in 2005, and Catalonia has been a leader in LGBTQ+ rights since the 1970s.

General Safety Tips:

- As in any major city, stay aware of pickpockets in crowded areas (La Rambla, Metro, tourist hotspots). Keep valuables secure and out of sight.
- The Raval and Gaixample are safe at night, but avoid dark, empty streets late at night as a general precaution.
- Barcelona has a benign Mediterranean climate, but summer heatwaves can be intense. Stay hydrated, especially at beach parties and Circuit events.
- LGBTQ+-specific violence is rare, but always trust your instincts. The community is visible and proud.

Essential Practical Tips

- Late-night culture: Barcelona nightlife starts LATE. Drag shows begin after 23:30, clubs don't fill until after 1am, and saunas peak 2-6am. Embrace the nocturnal schedule!
- Language: Barcelona is bilingual (Catalan and Spanish). Most people in the gay scene speak English. Learning a few Spanish/Catalan phrases is appreciated: 'Hola' (hello), 'Gràcies' (thanks), 'Si us plau' (please).
- Currency: Euro (€). ATMs widely available. Cards accepted everywhere, but have some cash for smaller bars.
- **Tipping:** Not expected but appreciated for great service. 5% is standard, 10% for excellent service.
- Best time to visit: Year-round! Spring (April-May) and Fall (Sept-Oct) have perfect weather and fewer tourists. Summer (June-Aug) brings Pride, Circuit, beach season, and intense heat. Winter is mild and uncrowded.
- Where to stay: Book accommodations in Gaixample for easy access to nightlife. Gay hotels: Axel Hotel Barcelona (iconic, rooftop pool), Two Hotel Barcelona (Axel's sister property). Many gay-friendly options on Misterb&b.;
- Apps: Grindr, Scruff, and other apps are very active in Barcelona. Be cautious with profiles during major events.
- **Dress code:** Barcelona is stylish but relaxed. Casual chic works for most bars. Some clubs prefer more polished looks. Beach bars welcome swimwear + cover-ups.

- 3. **Take advantage of happy hours** (usually 6-9pm)
- 4. Pregame before going out locals do it too!
- 5. **Eat the menú del día** (lunch special) at local restaurants (€10-14 for 3 courses)
- 6. Join free LGBTQ+ meetup groups for social activities
- 7. Visit Sitges by train (€10 round trip) instead of expensive organized tours
- 8. Stay in hostels or Misterb&b; instead of hotels during peak season
- 9. Free tapas! Some bars (like La Casa de la Pradera) give free tapas with drinks
- 10. **Take the Aerobus** (€7.75) from the airport instead of taxis (€35-40)
